


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

Prepare a Show

Elisa is anxious about the School Theatre Club rehearsal. How difficult is it to prepare and put on a show? Can it be a fun project? It can be enjoyable for people who can act, sing or dance. Also, it can be fun for people who can sing, play an instrument or write music. But, it can also be exciting for people who can write scripts, build theatre sets or design and make costumes.

How do you prepare a show? Here are 5 easy steps:

- 1. Decide where and when you want to have the show. This is the most important step. It'll help you decide what kind of show you can actually prepare. A small theatre means a smaller show than a bigger theatre. A small theatre needs fewer actors, dancers and singers to fill the stage.
- 2. Decide what kind of show you want to prepare. It is a classical play? Is it a modern comedy? Is it a detective story? Is it a drama? Is it a musical? This will help you decide the number and kind of actors you need. It'll also guide you with what kind of help and how much help you need for the show.
- 3. Decide the role for each volunteer. You may have more people who want to be in the show than you really need. So, you need to choose. This may be difficult because some people will be happy and others will be disappointed. You will need people to help you with the selection.
- 4. Decide on the important dates for rehearsals and other preparations. How much time do actors need to learn their lines? How much time do dancers need to learn their moves? How much time do singers and musicians need to learn the lyrics and the music? How many rehearsals do you need? When does the scenery need to be ready? How much time does making the costumes take?
- 5. Decide on practical details. What kind of programme are you going to have and who will prepare it? How many people are you going to invite and who will take care of that? Who will help people coming to the show to find their seats? Who is going to clean up after the show?

Remember that, before a show, you never wish people good luck. You always tell them to 'break a leg!'
